Lighting the Way: Equity is Excellence!

On October 16-17, 2020 New Mexico Association for the Gifted will provide quality professional development for teachers, parents, administrators and counselors of the gifted.

Lori Comallie-Caplan, President of NMAG shares her excitement about the quality of the presentations and presenters. "We have nine nationally known speakers and authors presenting in this conference!"

Keynote speakers include Shelagh Gallagher, Geoffrey Moon and Joy Lawson Davis. Dr. Shelagh A. Gallagher's career in gifted education spans 30 years, with positions including



teacher, Research Assistant (Duke TIP), Director of Research Assessment and (Illinois Mathematics and Science grant Academy), manager (William & Mary Center for Gifted Education), team member founding two gifted schools, and 13 years professor,

researcher, writer, and Javits grant director (UNC Charlotte).

New Mexico's own Geoffrey Moon, Geoffrey was recently honored as 2019 NAGC Gifted Coordinator Award Winner, for working with school faculty, developed a continuum of aligned program options for gifted students in Santa Fe, where he is the Gifted Education Program Support Specialist at Santa Fe Public Schools. He is the author of the NM-TAPAS (New Mexico-Talent and Potential Assessment System).

Dr. Davis is an award-winning author, scholar, professional learning trainer, researcher, and practitioner. Her area of expertise is addressing equity and access in Gifted Education programs. Dr Davis has provided training (for educators and parents) across the nation and internationally- in South Africa,

the Caribbean, Dubai & Turkey. In 2019, Dr. Davis was awarded the 2019 Lifetime Achievement Award from the Supporting Emotional Needs of the Gifted (SENG) and the Dr. Alexinia Baldwin Gifted & Special Populations award from the National Association for Gifted Children (NAGC).



A new feature in the Online Fall Institute will be prerecorded presentations from six well-known authors of gifted books and articles. Included in the lineup of spotlight speakers are: Ed Amend, Author of Misdiagnosis and Dual Diagnosis of Gifted

NMAG Stands in Solidarity with Black Lives Matter

George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, David McAtee, Tony McDade, Ahmaud Arbery. These are the names of Black men and women who have been victims of America's legacy of racism and police brutality. The New Mexico Association for the Gifted categorically denounces this legacy. We must use our positions as educators to advocate for an end to systemic racism and police brutality. We must use our positions as educators to unequivocally declare that Black Lives Matter.

As NAGC President, Jonathan Plucker stated in the organization's condemnation of this legacy, "the field of gifted education has a checkered past regarding the promotion of equity." These events should force us to re-evaluate the way that we view giftedness and our responsibilities to Black, Indigenous and People of Color students, teachers, parents, and communities and re-dedicate ourselves to ensuring equity for our students.

In the state of New Mexico this means ensuring equitable funding and services for gifted education in all schools regardless of zip code. It means ensuring that we use identification strategies that allow Black students to show their giftedness and not be hidden behind testing that preferences middle class, White students. It means being the voice in the room that demands that our schools, administrations, and communities acknowledge the history of racism in gifted education and provide ways forward. It means listening when Black students, parents, teachers, and communities tell us what they need. It means acknowledging the privileged positions that we speak from and amplifying the voices of the marginalized.

There is much work to be done in New Mexico and in the United States. We must listen, learn, and ensure that everyone is treated with dignity and respect. We must fight the inequities in our school systems and in our communities.

Black Lives Matter, Black Students Matter, Black Parents Matter, Black Educators Matter.
